## Local Graduate Recognized



Naval Weapons Industrial Reserve Plant (NWIRP) Bethpage  
Bethpage, New York

The United States Navy (Navy) with concurrence by New York State Department of Environmental Conservation has completed the second Five Year Review for Environmental Restoration Program (ERP) at the former NWIRP Bethpage. The purpose of a five-year review is to determine whether the selected remedy at a site remains protective of human health and the environment.

There are three ERP sites at NWIRP Bethpage that required a five year review: Site 1 – Former Drum Marshalling Area; Site 2 – Recharge Basin Area; and Site 3 – Salvage Storage Area. A description of the contamination and selected remedy for each site, summaries of work performed since the last Five Year Review, and a protectiveness determination are included in this 2013 report.
