Pentagon to revise danger pay roster

WASHINGTON — A Pentagon security review shows conditions improving in 18 countries once considered so dangerous that U.S. military serving there found something extra in their paychecks each month.

Now The Associated Press has learned the Defense Department wants to take those countries, plus five waterways, off the danger pay roster. The move would save about \$120 million a year while taking a bite out of an estimated 56,000 troops' salaries.

Defense officials described the proposal on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak publicly about it.

Senior defense and military leaders are expected to meet later this week to review the matter and are poised to approve a new plan. Pentagon press secretary George Little declined to discuss details but said no final decisions have been made.

Saudi princess nabbed in human trafficking

SANTA ANA, Calif. — A Saudi princess was charged Wednesday with human trafficking for allegedly holding a domestic worker against her will at an Orange County condominium, prosecutors said.

Orange County District Attorney Tony Rackauckas identified 42-year-old Meshael Alayban as a Saudi princess who was charged with one count of human trafficking. If convicted, she faces up to 12 years in prison.

Alayban was arrested after a Kenyan woman carrying a suitcase flagged down a bus and told a passenger she believed she was a human trafficking victim. The passenger helped her contact police, who searched the Irvine condo where Alayban and her family were staying, authorities said.

The 30-year-old woman was hired in Kenya in 2012 and her passport was taken from her on arrival in Saudi Arabia. She was forced to work excessive hours and was paid less than she was promised and not allowed to leave, authorities said.

Suspect: 'Not guilty'

Dzhokhar Tsarnaev, 19, appeared in court on Wednesday and pleaded not guilty on all charges.

BOSTON (AP) — His arm in a cast and his face swollen, a blase-looking Dzhokhar Tsarnaev pleaded not guilty Wednesday in the Boston Marathon bombing in a seven-minute proceeding that marked his first appearance in public since his capture in mid-April.

As survivors of the bombing looked on, Tsarnaev, 19, gave a small, lopsided smile to his two sisters upon arriving in the courtroom. He appeared to have a jaw injury and there was swelling around his left eye and cheek.

Leaning into the microphone, he told a federal judge, "Not guilty" in his Russian accent and said it over and over as the charges were read. Then he was led away in handcuffs, making a kissing gesture toward his family with his lips. One of his sisters sobbed loudly, resting her head on a woman seated next to her.

Tsarnaev, who has been hospitalized since his capture with wounds suffered in a shootout

and getaway attempt, faces 30 federal charges, including using a weapon of mass destruction to kill, in connection with the April 15 attack, which left three people dead and more than 260 wounded. He could get the death penalty if prosecutors choose to pursue it.

The proceedings took place in a heavily guarded courtroom packed not only with victims but with their families, police officers, and members of the public and the media.

The Russian immigrant and former college student looked much as he did in a photo widely circulated after his arrest, his hair curly and unkempt. Wearing an orange prison jumpsuit, he appeared nonchalant, almost bored, during the hearing. The cast covered his left forearm, hand and fingers.

The bombing victims showed little reaction in the courtroom after a federal marshal warned them against any outbursts.

WHITEY BULGER TRIAL

Jurors see photos of bodies unearthed

BOSTON — Jurors at James "Whitey" Bulger's racketeering trial have heard testimony about how the crime boss killed and buried people. They heard and saw in clinical detail Wednesday how detectives unearthed the victims after Bulger's partners began turning on him.

There also was chilling testimony at the trial about a young man who probably still has no idea how close he came to being killed when he nearly stumbled over Bulger as the gangster buried corpses three decades ago beneath a busy highway on the south side of the city.

The jury was confronted Wednesday with dozens of gruesome photographs of dark holes and skeletal remains. A prosecution forensic expert, Ann Marie Mires, spent the day using the photographs to illustrate how she and teams of detectives dug up the remains of four of the 19 people Bulger is accused of killing.

Mires' account was consistent with that a day earlier of Kevin Weeks, once Bulger's right hand man. Weeks

testified that he watched as Bulger and his partner Stephen "The Rifleman" Flemmi killed three of the victims. And he admitted that he helped dispose of the remains — twice.

Weeks said he first buried the bodies in the cellar of a house in South Boston, but had to move the remains to an empty lot in Dorchester, Mass., when the home's owner decided to sell.

Weeks led Mires and the state police detectives to the Dorchester gravesite, down a slope from the Southeast Expressway, in January 2000, after he was indicted and agreed to cooperate with authorities against his old boss.

Weeks also testified that Bulger confided to him once that he had buried another body at Tenean Beach, also in Dorchester. Mires was describing how she uncovered the Tenean Beach body as court adjourned Wednesday.

Weeks said the victims he buried personally were safe cracker Arthur "Bucky" Barrett, fisherman John McIntyre and Deborah Hussey, a stepdaughter of Flemmi's who claimed he sexually abused her.
