across from Squantum Drive, West View Road and Rogers Lane — have been around for years, he said.

And Wolanski said the six recommendations are not the only changes that need to be made so the zoning is in sync with the comprehensive plan.

Opening the workshop, Wolanski took attendees through the specifics of the zone changes, including:

- ◆ Boosting the intensity of the zoning on the 26 parcels on West Main Road to reflect what is happening in the neighborhood across from the Ox-bow Farms housing complex.

- ◆ Changing the zoning from residential to open space on the Tibbetts land and property around the Boulevard Nurseries, site of a rejected athletic fields plan earlier in the year.

- ◆ Making the zoning on seven lots on Oak View Terrace and Forest Avenue residential to reflect their current use instead of business.

- ◆ Switching the zoning on the BankNewport property at Two Mile Corner, where East Main and West Main roads meet, from office business to general business.

- ◆ Setting aside one lot on Honeyman Avenue from residential to limited business to allow growth of an existing mini-storage facility there.

- ◆ Lowering the intensity on 70 residential parcels on Paradise Avenue to reflect what is happening in the east side area near Prospect Avenue and Reservoir Road.

Planning Board Chairwoman Charlene Rose-Cirillo then opened the workshop to comments from the audience.

Olyphant Lane resident Scott Jestings said he would hate to see the West Main Road zone change intensify development north of his home. Saying the flooding at his home has intensified in recent years, Jestings said he'd like to see that area stay "as is."

"I'm just concerned anything done north of the brook will have impacts

on us," Jestings said.

In response, Wolanski said the property that is part of the zone change is already developed and not the same as the area being contemplated for a new 55-plus condominium development. Planning Board member Art Weber added that if Jestings is having trouble with the flow of Bailey Brook, his best option is to contact the town's Public Works Department for advice.

Forest Avenue resident Alice Curran wondered why a property next to Oak View Terrace isn't part of the recommended zone changes. She was told the town would look into the matter.

Honeyman Avenue resident Frank Campbell said he didn't want to see the construction and activity on Aquidneck Avenue creep further into his neighborhood. Wolanski said should anything happen on the Honeyman Avenue property, he plans to ask that there be no commercial access to the site to limit any impacts there.

"On Honeyman Avenue, we've had all kinds of construction from Aquidneck Avenue that's actually taken away from property values up there," Campbell said. "I don't want to see this again."

Paradise Avenue resident Kathleen Greenman questioned the potential impacts on her tax bill of a zone change to her property, something town officials said they'd have to research.

"When a zone is changed like that, does the tax assessment go up when you're in a higher square-foot zone?" Greenman asked. "It's a really major question."

No questions or comments were fielded at the Two Mile Corner or Tibbetts-Boulevard Nurseries sites.

In addition to a computer-aided slideshow used to spotlight each of the sites, there were large color maps of each of the impacted properties posted in the back of the council chambers for audience members to review.

"There's been a lot of interest in this and we want to move forward after a deliberate and well-thought-out dialogue," Wolanski said.
