REMAINS IDENTIFIED AS PAIR OF STUDENTS

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KENNEBUNKPORT, Maine — More than three weeks after human remains were found on Vaughn's Island, the state medical examiner's office confirmed Tuesday that they belonged to two Landing School students missing since December.

"The Kennebunkport Police Department received confirmation from the Maine State Medical Examiner's Office in Augusta, remains found on Feb. 10, 2013, were that of Zachary Wells and Prescott Wright, who have been missing since Dec. 19, 2012," said Kennebunkport police in a prepared statement. "Officers of the Kennebunkport Police Department have conducted other searches in the same area and have collected additional remains which have also been taken to the M.E.'s Office."

Nearly two months after

Wells and Wright disappeared, a local resident walking a dog discovered human remains at about 5 p.m. Feb. 10 on Vaughn's Island, just off the coast of Cape Porpoise.

The island can be reached from the mainland at low tide.

The remains were recovered by members of the town's police and fire departments.

"We continue to search for additional remains," said Kennebunkport Police Chief Craig Sanford. "All remains recovered are transported to the Medical Examiner's Office for testing."

Sanford said the medical examiner's office will conduct further tests to determine cause of death.

Wells, 21, and Wright, 23, were last seen at 5 Mills Road in Kennebunkport at about midnight on Dec. 20.

Wright and Wells were hanging out and drinking in a group of about four people at a Mills Road residence Dec. 19, when some people left and a

resident went up to bed, sometime around midnight.

Wells, of Burlington, Vt., lived at the Mills Road residence during the school year, and Wright, of Barnstable, Mass., lived on Port Road in Kennebunk during the school year. They were the last two people left downstairs that night.

Sanford said another resident, coming downstairs to turn a radio off at 4 a.m., noticed both men were gone.

Sanford said no vehicles were missing from the residence, which is located on the marsh, and that both men may have been intoxicated when they were last seen.

When Wells and Wright failed to attend classes the following two days, the school called police for help.

Police, the Coast Guard and Marine Patrol spent days checking the coastline, searching for the missing men.

On Dec. 24, police found life

jackets and clothing on Savin Bush Island that they believe belonged to one of the men.

Wells and Wright were both expected to head to their home states for the holidays. Instead, both families traveled to Kennebunkport to await word from officials.

The families of both men held memorial services in January.

At the Landing School, President Robert DeColf-macker said Tuesday that they had heard of the identifications through the media.

"We're a small college community, a tight-knit community," DeColf-macker said. "The men were well liked and are missed by all of us at the school."

The Kennebunkport Police Department is asking that anyone finding anything unusual report it to them as soon as possible.

Bail raised for mom facing drug charges

BRENTWOOD — Sheriff's deputies took a Newmarket mother who is facing child endangerment and drug charges into custody Tuesday, after a judge increased her bail at her arraignment in 10th Circuit District Court.

Judge Mark Weaver set bail for Nicole Fahey, 29, of 33 Elm St., Apt. 3, at \$5,000 corporate surety or \$500 cash after learning she had been arrested on drug charges in Andover, Mass., in February, about a month after her Newmarket arrest.

"The problem I've got is you were released on bail ... then you were arrested on another drug charge," Weaver said.

Police prosecutor Michael DiCroce said Fahey also didn't show up for a court hearing in Lawrence (Mass.) District Court following her arrest on

the Andover, Mass., charges, and asked the judge to set a \$5,000 cash bail in the case.

"She's a danger to repeat the offense and she's a danger not to appear," DiCroce said.

Fahey acknowledged she failed to show up for court after Andover, Mass., police arrested her and her boyfriend, Arthur Pudims, 35, also of 33 Elm St., Apt. 3, on multiple drug charges at a gas station in Newmarket on Feb. 20. Fahey, a mother of three, said she didn't appear because police seized their car when they were arrested. "I didn't have any transportation to get to court," she said.

Police were called to the couple's apartment Jan. 18, when neighbors heard two of her children, ages 6 and 10, crying outside in "sub-freezing temperatures." The children arrived home after school to find themselves locked out and their mother nowhere to be

found, police said. Newmarket police Lt. Kyle True said police located Fahey by calling her on the phone, but when they went inside the apartment, they found heroin in the open and within reach of the children, which led to drug charges against her and Pudims. Reading from the complaints Tuesday, Weaver said the heroin was found in Fahey's bedroom.

Asked Tuesday by Weaver if she was the main custodian of the three children, including a 4-year-old, Fahey said, "Yes, but they're staying with my sister and their father now."

Fahey had been released on personal recognizance bail after being arrested on a felony charge of heroin possession and two misdemeanor counts of endangering the welfare of a child in connection with the January incident.

Weaver increased the bail, saying it needed to include "some cash component" to

make sure Fahey appeared for her court dates. He also ordered her not to drink alcohol or use illegal drugs if she is able to post bail later.

Fahey pleaded not guilty to the child endangerment charges and the judge didn't allow her to enter a plea to the felony charge as she does not yet have a court-appointed attorney.

Pudims was also scheduled to be arraigned Tuesday, but he is being held in the Essex County Jail in Middleton, Mass.

Fahey faces charges of a Class A felony for possession of heroin and a Class B felony for possession of cocaine, as does Pudims, said Andover police Lt. William Ouellette. Pudims also faces charges of possession of an electronic stun gun and a dangerous weapon — a brass knuckles knife, according to Ouellette, who said police found cocaine, heroin and a crack pipe in the couple's car.

Bill: Posthumously grant freedom to N.H. slaves

CONCORD (AP) — More than 200 years later, New Hampshire lawmakers may honor a petition filled by 20 African-American slaves asking for their freedom.

The petition was not acted upon by New Hampshire General Assembly in 1779, but today, senators will hear from advocates who want them to posthumously grant the request. The petition cites the contribution of slaves to the Revolutionary War effort, but more importantly called on colonial-era legislators to recognize the inherent freedom of all humans. It would be another 85 years before the U.S. banned slavery following the Civil War.

New Hampshire is one of the least diverse states in the U.S., but recently the Legislature has increased efforts to celebrate the history and contributions of minorities in the state.

Event to look at culture, economy in Granite State
