ATTEMPTED MURDER CHARGES FOR MOM

Seabrook woman allegedly tried to kill kids with bleach

SEABROOK — The Seabrook mother accused of forcing her 6- and 7-year-old children to drink bleach was attempting to kill them, according to an indictment handed up from a Rockingham County grand jury this month.

Wendy Wright, 33, of 15 True Road, was charged with two counts of attempted murder, carrying a maximum sentence of life in prison, and two counts of first-degree assault, a Class-A felony.

According to Seabrook police, Wright uttered that she wanted to kill herself and her children after regaining consciousness from her own dose of bleach.

"I don't want to live. I really love my kids, but I wanted to save them from everyone else," Seabrook officer Keith Diethofer allegedly overheard Wright saying to emergency personnel treating her June 18 after nine police officers responded to her home.

Wright allegedly held down her children and poured bleach down their throats. She waived her probable cause hearing at the Seabrook District Court on July 29, and the case moved on to Superior Court.

Both children were able to spit out most of the bleach they were given by their mother, who was calling it "medicine," according to police. After Wright became unconscious, the children went next door and found a neighbor, who called the police after the girl "barged in" the back door and asked "if her and her brother can stay here for an hour while

(their) mother is sick." "The girl said the mother (took) medicine and (the) mother made (the) boy and girl take medicine, too," the neighbor wrote in a statement to police, according to the police affidavit. While fire personnel responded and treated the boy and girl, police went to the mother's apartment, where "a strong odor of bleach was present," according to the affidavit. Wright was unconscious on a love seat in the living room, police wrote, and there was vomit on her and the love seat. There was also a bottle of bleach sitting on the floor next to her, the affidavit states.

As Wright was being treated, she regained consciousness and uttered her desire to no longer live and that she "wanted to save (her children) from everyone else."

"Sergeant (David) Buccheri advised that it appeared that Wendy Wright's intention was to take her own life as well as her two small children that were present," the affidavit states.

Seabrook prosecutor Scott Mendes previously said the children have been placed in a safe home.

Wright is being held in Rockingham County Jail, according to County Attorney Jim Reams.

Miss N.H. wins prelim

Singing wows crowd at Miss America competition

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. — Miss America contestants from New Hampshire and Mississippi won the first night of preliminary competition Tuesday as the pageant returned to Atlantic City after a six-year absence.

Samantha Russo, Miss New Hampshire, won a \$2,000 scholarship in the talent competition by singing "Don't Rain On My Parade" from the musical "Funny Girl."

She chose the Barbra Streisand number despite being warned against it by many supporters who felt it was too difficult.

"Everyone told me not to, but I felt really confident with it," she told reporters afterward.

Miss Mississippi, Chelsea Rick, won a \$1,000 scholarship in the lifestyle and fitness competition, also known as the swimsuit competition.

As the preliminaries began, each of the 53 young women competing for the Miss America crown aimed to first introduce herself and her home in a humorous and hopefully attention-getting way. Some, like Miss Kentucky, succeeded before the first spectator took a seat.

"From the home of fast horses and beautiful women — better not get those two things mixed up — I'm Jenna Day, Miss Kentucky!" she said in rehearsals.

In a nod to still-sore Cleveland Cavaliers fans, Miss Ohio, Heather Wells, tweaked basketball star LeBron James, whose defection to the Miami Heat enraged the Buckeye State.

"I won't be taking my talents to South Beach because they're right here in Atlantic City!" she said, riffing on the wording of James' nationally televised announcement of where he would sign as a free agent.

Exeter Fire Lt. charged with DWI

Allegedly struck parked pickup truck with car

EXETER — A Fire Department lieutenant is on paid administrative leave after being arrested and charged with driving while intoxicated after allegedly striking a parked vehicle.

Fire Lt. Norman Byrne, 45, of Brentwood, was arrested at 9:45 p.m. Sept. 4 on Spruce Court, according to

Police Capt. William Shupe said Byrne is also facing a pending charge of conduct after an accident.

According to Shupe, the call started as a report of an altercation at Alltown Mobile gas station on Epping Road, where Byrne was allegedly involved in a verbal confrontation with another individual.

Through witness statements, police tracked Byrne's vehicle to a residence on

Spruce Court, according to Shupe.

Shupe said police learned through additional investigation that Byrne's Dodge pickup truck allegedly struck a parked vehicle downtown while Byrne was driving to Spruce Court following the alleged verbal altercation.

The parked vehicle sustained minor damage and no one was injured, according to Shupe.

Fire Chief Brian Comeau said Byrne has been with the department for 27 years and is on paid administrative leave, pending his court date.

"It's a personnel matter and it's in the hands of the Police Department," Comeau said.

Byrne was released on \$1,000 personal recognizance bail and is scheduled to appear at the 10th District Circuit Court in Brentwood on Monday, Sept. 16.

Byrne earned \$82,182 from the town last year, according to the Town Report.

police in late July, he said.

"It essentially looks like something that you would put your card right into," Peracchi said of the device, which is capable of recording customers' bank account information. The device is now in the possession

of police as evidence, he said.

Peracchi said police believe the suspect collected bank account information via the device and Bank of America is aware that data may have been compromised.

"They're working with customers," he said of the bank. "They're aware that we have

an investigation going on."

Peracchi said he has not seen this type of scam in Portsmouth before, but added it is something that police agencies in New Hampshire and Massachusetts have recently been dealing with more frequently.

Detectives reviewed bank surveillance footage and obtained images of the man they believe placed the device on the ATM. Peracchi said investigators first tried to identify the man themselves, but are now turning to the public for help.

Police described the suspect as a white man with brown

hair. He was wearing black sunglasses, a red T-shirt and gray pants when he was captured on a surveillance camera placing the device on the ATM.

Record of Decision for Operable Unit 4 – Site 5 and Offshore Areas Potentially Impacted by PNS Onshore Installation Restoration Program Sites
Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, Kittery, Maine

The U.S. Navy proudly announces the signing of a Record of Decision (ROD) for Operable Unit (OU) 4, which includes Site 5 – Former Industrial Waste Outfalls, and Offshore Areas Potentially Impacted by PNS Onshore Installation Restoration (IR) Program Sites at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, Kittery, Maine. The Navy and U.S. Environmental Protection Agency jointly signed the ROD in August 2013 with Maine Department of Environmental Protection concurrence. The ROD documents the selected remedies for OU4 under the federal Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA). Fourteen monitoring stations were located within OU4 to address offshore contamination from past releases from Site 5 and PNS Onshore IR Program Sites. The OU4 remedies were selected based on these monitoring stations. For Monitoring Stations 01, 03, 04, and 12 (A and B portions), the Selected Remedies include dredging of contaminated sediment, dewatering of sediment, and disposal of dredged sediment in an off-yard landfill to eliminate potential unacceptable ecological risks. There are no unacceptable risks for Monitoring Stations 02, 05, 06, 07, 08, 09, 10, 11, 13, and 14; therefore, No Further Action are the Selected Remedies for these monitoring stations. The Selected Remedies for OU4 will allow for unlimited use and unrestricted exposure for the offshore area, such that land use controls, operation and maintenance, monitoring, inspection, and five-year reviews will not be required after removal of contaminated sediment from Monitoring Stations 01, 03, 04, and 12 (A and B portions). The ROD also includes the Navy's responses to the public comments received on the Proposed Plan.
